We are a seamless K-12 independent co-educational college in Coolum Beach, on the Sunshine Coast, Queensland.

Characteristics of the Student Body:

In 2024, the College's student body consists of full-time students enrolled in classes from Prep to Year 12, with more students in the Primary than in the Secondary grades. Most students live within a 20-minute radius of the College, though a few are located more than 30 minutes away. Due to the College's location and surrounding roads, walking or biking to school is not feasible, so the majority of students commute via the College buses or are dropped off/picked up by their parents.

The College follows an open enrolment policy, attracting students with a wide range of academic abilities and backgrounds. Some students require additional support, while others need extension opportunities. The College reflects the cultural diversity of the local Coolum/Sunshine Coast area, and a notable portion of the student population regularly participates in Christian church activities within the community.

The students at the College have varied talents and interests. They have achieved notable success in sports, and the secondary school has produced impressive drama productions. The College's educational program is aligned with the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) and the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA).

Social Climate

In 2024, the College continued to prioritise student wellbeing. This was achieved through daily pastoral care lessons, chaplaincy, learning enrichment support, and collaboration with parents, as well as the College's signature initiative—the Heart and Brain Matters program. This program integrates strategies with Christian values to support students in developing emotional regulation, resilience, and interpersonal skills. It empowers students to understand the connection between their thoughts, emotions, and behaviours.

The Heart and Brain Matters program is complemented by the College's broader pastoral care framework, which includes regular check-ins, mentoring, and advocacy. Together, these initiatives ensure that every student is known, valued, and supported throughout their educational journey.

Feedback from parents, students, and staff in 2024 reflected high levels of satisfaction with the College. Families consistently praised the College's commitment to character development, strong communication, and the safe, respectful learning environment fostered across all year levels. The College's social climate is further enriched by opportunities for service, leadership, and community engagement, helping students develop a sense of purpose and belonging.

The Parent engagement and support of the College remains at a high level of positivity, with an increased number of volunteers engaging with the College and being active and consistent in attending and supporting the P&F (Parent and Friends).

The College continues to see overall growth, reflecting its commitment to excellence and community engagement. However, further work is needed to improve student retention rates. Exit surveys indicate that students predominantly leave the College due to normal demographic changes and in search of better support options for learning difficulties. This feedback is being used to inform future planning and support strategies.
